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1. Background of the Programme

Dr. Ram Manohar Lohia National Law University organized a “**Summer Human Rights Training Programme -2008**” from 16th June to 15th July, 2008. This programme was designed for a period of one month.

This Training programme was sponsored by National Human Rights Commission, New Delhi. This is the first time when NHRC has sponsored such



a training programme outside Delhi. The 60 participants were from all over the State of Uttar Pradesh and all of them had the background of Law, Sociology, Criminology, Political Science, etc. It was an opportunity for them to learn the Human Rights Laws, Practice, Problems and Solutions.

2. The Design of the Programme

In the **First Week**, the interns were exposed to India's commitment towards the International Human Rights Protection and India's contribution in this regard. The University also planned to have a brief discussion on the problems and



position of the Human Rights in the neighbouring countries- South East Asia. In this week, there was an interaction on different facets of constitutional vision of Human Rights



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in India and how far India achieved the goals set forth before the country by the framers of the Constitution of India. No discussion on a Human Rights Laws can be complete without any detailed deliberations on the Authorities/Agencies established by Law to protect the Human Rights. The



discussion covered the functions of the Authorities/Agencies and how far they achieved the objectives set forth before these authorities by the Legislature.

In the **Second Week**, the deliberations on the role of role players in the protection and healthy development of human rights took place. The NGOs, Human Rights Activist, Authorities responsible for the protection of Human Rights exposed the interns and told them about the available and non-available human rights and the problems of enforcement of the policies. The resource persons pointed out the contributions made by such authorities, NGOs and they gave their suggestions in the protection of the human rights. Their field experience showed the interns that human rights were not the items meant for the statue book but it must reach to the common people having commitment and will to enforce them. If the strategy is quite perfect in ensuring the human rights then the desired goals can be achieved. These resource persons also invited the interns to participate in their activities and with this effort the interns also got the first hand exposure about the position of human rights in action.

In the **Third Week**, the interns were placed in 12 leading Non Government Organizations of the Lucknow District. The interns were placed with the purpose that they will make a small on-spot study and the experts of that organizations accompanied the interns to brief them





with the first hand information. With this type of initiatives the interns could know where actually the human rights issues needed more attention and how they could bring new vision in the lives of poor and victims of human rights violation.

In the *Last Week*, the interns presented their field report and a viva-voce examination was held to find out how seriously they were involved in the training programme.

During the whole month of the training, the interns were allowed to use the library facilities, internet and wi-fi facility of the University. In the valedictory, the interns were provided the certificates of their participation.

3. Key Issues Addressed

In this one month Summer Human Rights Training Programme almost all the aspects of human rights were covered and 51 resource persons and other luminaries and icons in the field of human rights protection like Hon'ble Justice Mr. Rajendra Babu, Chairman Human Rights Commission, Prof. N.R. Madhva Menon, Hon'ble Justice Mr. Cheema, Chairman State Human Rights Commission, Hon'ble Justice Mr. V.C.Mishra, Chairman, State Law

Commission, Mr. Jyotindra Mishra, Advocate General of Uttar Pradesh, Sri Vikram Singh, Director General of Police of Uttar Pradesh etc. blessed the interns with their words of wisdom.

5. Proceedings of the Programme

The participants coming from the different districts of Uttar Pradesh were welcomed by the volunteers of the Dr. Ram Manohar Lohiya National Law University. On the very first day, soon after the registration process and allotment of hostel rooms, the reading material were given to them in advance. The purpose of giving the

material before starting the programme was to build some understanding towards human rights issues so that they could effectively participate in the entire training programme.

On the first day of the one month Summer Human Rights Training Programme, 62 students from all over Uttar Pradesh who were graduates/ students in Law/pursuing courses in social science etc were registered as the participants of the programme. Dr. Atul Kumar Tiwari, Convener, of the Programme addressed the participants and gave them a feel of Human Rights related issues. There was a familiarization visit to the Dr. Ram Manohar Lohiya National Law University Library along with Mr. Manish Bajpayee, Assistant Librarian of the University.

There was an Ice-breaking Session by Mr. Kumar Askand Pandey, wherein participants introduced themselves and mixed-up with each other. The participants enjoyed the Session filled with fun; the purpose of which was to basically enhance the level of interaction among the



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participants and to lessen the communication gap between the participants and the organizers.

The Inaugural Ceremony of the Summer Human Rights Training Programme was held on 17th June. Hon'ble Justice Sri. V.C. Mishra, the Chief Guest graced the occasion in the presence of Shri Jyotindra Mishra, Advocate General of U.P. The Guest of Honour Justice V.C. Mishra expressed his pleasure on the initiative taken by Dr. Ram Manohar Lohia National Law University and the enthusiasm of the participants. The Director of Dr. Ram Manohar Lohiya National Law University, Prof. Balraj Chauhan, also addressed the participants. He ensured them that

the-state-of-art facilities and hospitality extended, will make them feel a home away from home. Advocate General of U.P., Shri Jyotindra Mishra spoke on Human Rights in a lucid way stressing upon women empowerment. Dr. A.K. Tiwari, convener of the Summer Human Rights Training programme was the host of the Inaugural Ceremony. At the end, Prof. L.N. Mathur proposed a vote of thanks to all the dignitaries present.

Prof. S. K. Bhatnagar, Dean, School of Legal Studies, Baba Saheb Bhimrao Ambedkar University, Lucknow gave a lecture on Fundamental Rights: A Bird's eye view, and elaborated on the growth of Human Rights Movements. He started





with the origin of rights and made the participants aware of the challenges before the Human Rights. He also covered the aspect of the meaning of human rights for a common man.

Mrs. Vandana Singh, Lecturer in History, Dr. Ram Manohar Lohiya National Law University, Lucknow, spoke on "History of Evolution of Human Rights." She discussed the Magna Carta and also made the students aware of the organization for the protection of Human Rights in the present scenario. She also focused on the chronological development of Human Rights and discussed the mechanisms to protect the Human Rights.

Prof. D.P. Tiwari, Deptt. of Ancient Indian History, University of Lucknow spoke on "Historical Evolution of Human Rights in India". He started up with the position of Human Rights in Independent India. Further he talked on the position of women in Ancient India. It was a very interactive Session. In his lecture, he talked about the evolution of human being, contractual theory of society and the concept of rights and duties

present in ancient India. He also touched the traditions of the tribal communities of India and how they follow the principle of natural justice.

Dr. Sanjay Gupta, Reader, Deptt. of Political Science., Lucknow University, gave another interesting lecture on "The Third World Concept Of Human Rights". He cleared the concepts of participants on different rights and the International Covenants on Human Rights. Then he spoke on the position of Human Rights in Post 1945 Era. He also awakened the students on the concept of Solidarity Rights, which is an emerging concept on Human Rights. The students gained a lot from his motivating lecture which forced the students to think on the issues of Human Rights. Right from the concept of human rights in developed countries, developing countries and poor countries he has thrown the light on each and every aspect of human rights.

Prof. S. P. Srivastava, Deptt. of Social Work, Lucknow University dealt on "Universal Declaration of Human Rights". In the opening lecture he focused his attention on the Rights



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of Women. He emphasized that 60% of women in this country are illiterate. He stressed upon the feel that the ground reality was that justice was not reaching to the poor and the downtrodden. He also focused on the scenario and tragedy of urbanization. Another hard reality which he discussed was on the preservation of family which, according to him, should be of prime concern. He also deliberated on the issue of increasing infant mortality.

Dr. Mahima Sharma, Senior Faculty, Jaipuria Institute of Management, Lucknow, delivered next lecture on a very interesting topic "Globalisation, Business and Human Rights". She focused on certain key issues relating to the food crisis along with the efforts being made at International levels. She emphasized upon the principles of Corporate Social Responsibility. Problems created by Special Economic Zones was also dealt upon. It was definitely an intellectual food for the participants.

Prof. A.K. Awasthi, Dean, Faculty

of Law, Lucknow University took another motivating lecture on "Constitutional Perspective of Human Rights". Human Rights are not new for us they are deeply entrenched in our lives. The Judiciary, by widening the scope of Article 21, has incorporated about 17 supplementary rights. Certain important issues discussed included the reputation of a dead person, the legitimacy of child etc. Right to property being a Human Right, according to Prof. Awasthi, required a serious application of mind by all of us. He stressed on women related issues. According to Judicial pronouncements Womanhood is the most important aspect of life and Motherhood is the essence of Womanhood. He suggested that it is the right time that we recognize and respect the Human Rights of others also. He further pointed out to honor Human Rights a perfect equilibrium between various organs of the State, between citizen and State was required. He informed the participants that we must understand these Human Rights in a right perspective,





only then will we be able to respect and honour Human Rights.

Dr. T.P. Singh, Reader, Deptt. of Political Science, Banaras Hindu University, gave a very enlightening lecture on "Terrorism and Human Rights". He pointed out that terrorism was a challenge not only for India but also for International community and became a Global phenomenon; It was a psychological war of the weak against the strong. He discussed the terrorism in India into three parts and also explained the concept of Naxalism. According to him, terrorism and Human Right were not antithetical but complementary to each other. He also focused on the Judicial response against terrorism.

Prof. Shailendra Kapoor of Ancient Indian History Deptt., University of Lucknow, gave a very unique and matchless oratory on the topic "Human Rights in India -Historical context". In his elaboration of topic, he commented that not high standard of living but high standard of culture which brings happiness to us.

Smt. Manju Chandra, Special

Secretary, Home, Uttar Pradesh, gave a lecture on "Protection of Human Rights Act, 1993" . She also dealt upon the role of the State Human Rights Commission in the protection of human rights. She delivered lecture on the function, procedure followed by the commissions in the protection of human rights. She also talked about the human rights of the mental and physical health of the deprived persons.

The participants got the opportunity to listen to the renowned persons, Sri Nagendra and Ms. Shalini from Sahbhagi Sikshan Kendra (NGO), Lucknow, who are working directly with the people. They are working on Human Rights and local self-Governance. The participants got a feel of the importance of Human Rights as they got an opportunity to watch a Documentary prepared by them on the basis of their field work.

Dr. A.K. Tiwari, Faculty In-charge (Academics), Dr. Ram Manohar Lohiya National Law University, Lucknow took a very important lecture on "Project Guidance". Every participant of this Training Programme was supposed to



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submit a Project Report at the end of the Training Programme. Dr. Tiwari explained the different steps in writing research report. He also presented with the help of multimedia projector, the layout of the research writing. Certain very important links were told to the students which were quite useful for case law search, for finding the full text of central legislations. He also showed the students how to do e-research.

Prof. S.K. Singh, Department of Law, University of Lucknow, delivered talk on the topic "Human Rights and Good Governance". He pointed that there cannot be Human Rights without Good Governance. Human Rights can be best protected in a democracy. He explained the students the relation between Human Rights and Good Governance. Need for recognition of Animal rights was also advocated by him. Dignity, equality, justice and freedom were, according to him, the most important rights for any individual. He discussed some very important cases where, he pointed out judiciary was one of the greatest violators of the Human Rights.

Ms. Shalini Mathur from Suraksha (NGO) gave lecture on a very sensitive issue of "Violence Against Women". She emphasized in this field our way of thinking has not changed with time. The need was that we all have to be sensitive and feel the pain of women who had been exploited physically, sexually and mentally. She highlighted the problem of patriarchal society. The condition of women Widow is deplorable. She also touched upon another fact which brings death.

Dr. Neelam Singh, Director, *Vatsalya* (NGO) and also a leading Gynecologist, explained another vital concept of "Public Health and Rights of Children". She pointed out that in Uttar Pradesh there was highest Neo Natal Mortality Rate. Poor implementation of the project and schemes were responsible for this scenario.

The participants were blessed with the presence of Hon'ble Justice Vishnu Sahai, Member, U.P. State Human Rights Commission. Apart from being a good judge he also has academic excellence. He expressed his

satisfaction looking at the massive University and was also pleased with the efforts of the University to take the initiative to organize the wonderful Programme. He pointed out that Right to Life is the greatest Human Right. He made a very practical approach in analyzing the concept of Fundamental Rights. He deliberated on the importance of right to speedy trial, right to food. He also drew the picture of people living below poverty line, people living in slums in Metros; living in a very deplorable condition. For them the talk of human rights was a dream not reality. He also deliberated on the Right of Terrorists. A terrorist was as such entitled to Human Rights as any of us were. He also pointed out the problem areas in our system, one of the problems being that the ratio between population and number of Judges is perhaps the poorest in India. He encouraged and motivated students to imbibe and inculcate the values, they learn from the programme and thereby serve the society in the best possible way.

Prof. Dr. Surendra Singh, Former Vice-chancellor, Kashi Vidya Peeth

gave another interesting lecture on "Right to Development as Human Rights". Development should be without tears. Without Development even our basic needs cannot be satisfied. According to him, Food and Water crisis were going to take a very serious form. We are already witnessing Energy Crisis. Simple living and high thinking has changed to High living and small thinking. We have a responsibility towards the society and we must understand and respect our duty towards the society. There should be sustainable development. He stirred the mind of the participants to think and find possible solutions of the social issues.

Mr. Kumar Askand Pandey, Faculty, Dr. Ram Manohar Lohiya National Law University, Lucknow took an interesting and thought provoking lecture on "The Impact of Corruption on Human Rights". There is *enough for every one's need but not enough for any one's greed -Mahatma Gandhi*. All human beings have basic Human Rights to live in a Corruption free society. Corruption is the biggest polluter of environment. Mr. Pandey



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explained to the student the various ways in which corruption affects Human Rights.

Mr. Sriram Arun, Ex DGP. & Ex Chairman, SC/ST Commission gave a very interesting and thought provoking lecture on the subject Human Rights of Weaker Section. In the opening lecture he dealt with some constitutional aspect of Rights of weaker sections and said that we have to change the attitude of the people. It will be false promises to any society unless the perception of people changes. He also mentioned that working of the commission, more autonomy was required, without this it was not easy to give justice to mainly weaker sections. He also said that some time by the interference by courts and politics, proper implementation is lacking. He also mentioned about some instances where SC/ST Commission worked hard for the Rights of weaker sections and told about harsh realities about Guzzar Meena Violence.

Prof. S. P. Srivastava gave lecture on Human Trafficking.

According to him, trafficking is procurement or transportation to internal state or external borders for pecuniary gains or economic gains. It is the most pernicious form of exploitation of man by man. It is the most flagrant violation of Human Rights. He explained the concept of white slavery. Human Trafficking is one of the most emerging and flourishing kind of organized crime. He pointed out that the problem in India was that although we had strong laws in India but enforcement was very weak. 1.2 million people trafficked every year and half of them were Females generally between the age group of 13-22 years.

Sri Ram Kumar, Dynamic Networking Action Group, U.P. gave a lecture on Rights of SC/ST. He pointed out that their position has not improved still they are barred from their rights and are discriminated. He talked about Mushahar scheduled Tribe. In context of Uttar Pradesh, he told that 40% people were living below the poverty line.

Sri S.K. Srivastava, Deputy Director, Vikalang Kalyan, Govt. of





U.P., gave a lecture on Disability and Human Rights. Seven types of disabilities were told. He informed that presentation and early detection should be the steps taken for this condition. A person can be called a Disabled person only if his efficiency is below 40%. Madam Usha Tiwari, Special Teacher, National Institution for Visually Handicapped, Dehradun, told some steps should be taken before and after going to the school. The problem faced by deaf and blind persons at public places was discussed. She suggested that sensitivity, morality and awareness can be the only possible solutions to this sensitive issue.

Mr. Sanjay Singh, Dr. RML NLU, Lucknow talk about the Untouchables, Dalits and their Human Rights. Some very sensitive issues were raised. Whether a Non Dalit is in a position to enter Dalit Home? It is impossible for 73% Dalits to enter the society of Non Dalits. Even after 60 years of Independence, he pointed out that the dalits were still discriminated. Why in India this particular concept of pollution and purity exists?.

Untouchability is nowhere defined , but the tragedy is that it is well accepted by the society. He discussed the kinds of disabilities in Indian villages. The issues were discussed with respect to both insider's and outsider's perspective.

Mr. A.P. Singh, Faculty, Dr. Ram Manohar Lohiya National Law University, Lucknow gave an insight of the Jurisprudence issues of Human Rights. Why is there an Hierarchy of Human Rights Legislations if the theme is same? He mentioned that the human Rights cannot be discussed in isolation as they are part of an integral concept. If the State has a lesser transgressor of Human Rights, only then, that state is worth living. To what extent a State and the Legal system has "promoted Human Rights" by making new policies legislation and by strengthening Human machinery? Why Unlike Art 32, the Constitution of India, Art 226 is not a Fundamental Right merely by virtue of it not being under Part-III of the Constitution.

Prof. S. P. Srivastava, Social Work, Lucknow University delivered a talk on the Rights of Prisoners.



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Prisoners were sent to prisons not for punishment. Until 40 years ago, there was no focused discussion upon Rights of the Prisoners. It was a prevalent notion that prisoners were slaves of the State therefore they had no legal Rights. Jail was a small society in itself. A criminal did not become a non Human Being the moment he enters the jail. The grossest violation of Human Rights in jail is violation of right to liberty. The prisoners have right to health, right to free legal aid and above all right to self expression.

Prof. R.B.S. Verma, Head, Social Work, Lucknow University gave a lecture on social work intervention in the protection of Human Rights. To develop our skill, he pointed out we need social research. Action at large scale was required. Intervention was facilitating change in a systematic manner. It should be purposeful, directed and goal oriented. Major intervention were told. Awareness, according to him was the most important aspect of Human Right Commission.

Dr. Subodh Gupta, Former Director, U.P. Health Directorate delivered on "Human Rights and Right to Health". Right to health was a basic Human Right. He told that the preventive and curative sides of the diseases. He pointed out that the leprosy has been controlled to a large extent and efforts are being taken for the eradication of the disease. Nothing is better than prevention in case of AIDS. He suggested that the easy detection could be the best effort for early treatment of cancer. Diseases caused due to occupational hazards was on the rise. In case of infant mortality, 60% infants die within 1 hour after their birth. 33% children were born underweight.

Dr. A.K. Tiwari delivered a lecture on 'Human Rights and Intellectual Property Rights'. This, according to him, was an emerging issue in Human Rights and Human Rights approach and it differs from a normally legal or economic interpretation of Intellectual Property Rights in various ways. Trips prescribes minimum standards and





member nations are free to adopt higher standard. The problem, he pointed out, was that this minimum standard was a high standard for developing or under developed countries. What about maximum standard? How to provide cheaper and sufficient drugs to needy people at affordable prices. Issue of farmers right and plant breeders right was also discussed and debated. Some international conventions relating to Intellectual Property Rights were not recognizing Human Rights but Human Right Conventions were recognizing Intellectual Property Rights.

Sri Atul Chandra, Editor, Times of India, Lucknow delivered a talk on the Role of Media in protecting Human Rights. A very recent issue of Aarushi's Murder Case and the complexities of issues involved in the case was discussed. Participants highly debated on the issue, whether Terrorists had Human Rights or not whether capital punishment should be abolished was another debatable issue. Fake encounters were fake. This was another sensitive issue which needs serious consideration.

Ms. Usha Kiran, Dept. of Women and Child Welfare, deliberated on Schemes in the Government for the women welfare. She told about the provisions of the scheme and discussed the various problems of implementation. Decision making power was hardly vested in the hands of women. Women were considered as second grades. She discussed the Dowry Prohibition Act, Immoral Trafficking Act and said that their department was working hard for the empowerment of women and child and several schemes; however Empowerment would take time.

Prof. B.B. Pandey, Consultant, National Human Rights Commission delivered a lecture on "Basic Human Needs". Many debatable issues were raised. Is security not possible without violation of Human Rights? What if we don't get security even after securing Human Rights? Food need was the biggest need. Only if lower level needs were fulfilled one can think of higher level needs. Locating the basic Human needs controlling population should be the first and foremost step in securing Human Rights. Poverty was one of the biggest violations of



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Human Right. Free, National thinking was important. The best inside the individual should come out for every human being for a peaceful society. Credibility in India was low. This was the main problem.

Dr. Harbans Dixit , Magistrate, JJ Board, Moradabad delivered on concept of Juvenile Justice and Protection of Human Rights. Human Rights were Rights which were Human specific. Man needed Liberty from discrimination, Liberty from oppression, Liberty from conscience, Liberty of integration. Various provisions of Juvenile Justice Act were discussed. He pointed out, today 40% of our population were below 18 years of age. They had been treated differently from other sections of the society, There should be no adverse effect on career of child even if charges are proved. There is no distinction between Bailable and non-Bailable offence in the Juvenile Justice Care and Protection Act, 2000.

Dr. Ali Mehdi, Reader, Law, BHU delivered a talk on the water right and Human Rights. Though water was

a renewable resource but the source is very limited. We are facing the most serious problem of water crisis. Water Right has been considered to be a natural right. The water should be consumed and judiciously used, for ensuring the availability of water in the times to come when the matter come to environmental issues Law was not very forceful. There has been paucity of Law, poverty of Law to deal with water crisis. The water crisis is related with the question of life and death.

Dr. Madhu Agarwal, Director, National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development (NIPCCD), Kursi Road, delivered on Right to Nutrition. Easy life was most important for ensuring healthy mind and healthy body and only a healthy body can contribute to the development of the nation. Infant mortality rate in Uttar Pradesh was 73% this is a serious problem. Sex ratio in Uttar Pradesh was 898. 47.3% children in India were malnourished. A malnourished Child is another challenge. In Eight years we could reduce mal nutrition only by 1%. Only





22% delivery in Uttar Pradesh take place in hospitals use of serial pulse combination is 5: 1.

Dr. A. K. Tiwari and Mr. K.A. Pandey took a Session on project presentation. Participants were given an opportunity to present the Human Rights Violation in their District. Prostitution, Human Trafficking, Child Abuse, Poverty, Sexual Harassment, Police Atrocities. These were the common issues raised by the participants. Participants shared their experiences; and the efforts by them in protecting Human Rights.

Mr. K.A. Pandey, Faculty, Dr. Ram Manohar Lohiya National Law University, delivered a talk on Human Rights and Media. Media, according to him was the fourth pillar of Democracy. Crime has always fascinated media. Every crime is a Human Rights violation story. Media should not only make people aware of Human Rights violation but also show some follow up action as an impact of the news. Whether media can be prosecuted for Telephone Tapping? Other issues were whether media itself is a Human Right? Media

as a Champion of Human Rights, Media as a violation of Human Rights in some case were told. The main problem was that in some cases media failed to differentiate between “In Public Interest” and “of Interest to Public”.

Dr. Mridul Srivastava, Assistant Professor, NLIU, Bhopal deliberated on the Right to Shelter. Living with Human Dignity was important and necessary and not a mere Animal Existence. Until and unless there was a proper shelter for Human Being, development was not possible. The role of people living in slums was also discussed. He pointed out that there were 620 slums in Lucknow but in Census of India 2001, Lucknow was shown as City Without Slum. Development should be culturally vibrant. Why the Housing Right bill has not been converted into an Act? Political Willingness is lacking. 13 International Instruments are dealing with Right to Shelter but still the situation is very pathetic for the poor. The loaning facility for the housing is so complicated that a middle class person cannot take this, then what to do with poor.



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Mr. Ashish Pandey, Lecturer English, Dr. RML NLU gave the lecture on use of English and Human Rights very unique way with the help of film clipings. He showed the use of language in protection and violation of Human Rights.

Sri Vikram Singh, DGP, U.P. spoke on the topic "Police and Human Rights". He shared his real life experiences. The number of encounters has reduced by 75%. Investigation is just 20% of the work of a police officer. Police officers work under tremendous pressure and under an imminent danger to life and limb. He pointed out that in Uttar Pradesh, the condition was such that there was only a single police officer against 1200 persons (in contrast to 1:300 in Delhi, 1:80 in U.K. and U.S.A). He told that happiness and dignity were not the prerogative of any particular class, instead it was the birthright of every individual. Not only Human beings but all beings should be happy. We should understand the difference between need to know and right to know. Now-a-days, the approach is zero tolerance to corruption and Human

Rights violations and successfully the figures have come down from 90% to 40%. According to him fake encounters were a wild justice. It was no justice at all. He encouraged the participants to have professionalism, perseverance and non violence in their life which was a key to success.

Mr. S.S. Upadhyay, Dept. Director, Judicial Training Research Institute, Lucknow took a lecture on "Role of lower Judiciary in protection of Human Rights". Condition in jails was still very deplorable. Jails were overcrowded with no proper fooding and lodging facilities. Medical facilities were in adequate because of want of funds and because of other problems. He also talked about the Special Session courts, action for illegal detention. He mentioned that there was want of clarity in the procedural aspects.

Mr. Bhagwat Prasad Singh, Akhil Bhartiya Samaj Sewa Sansthan, Chitrakoot, gave a lecture on "Entitlement Rights and Rights of Kol Tribes". He told about various Government Schemes, both at the Central and State level, along with





their level of implementation. Talking about Kol tribes he told of their status as SC in the state of U.P. Akhil Bhartiya Samaj Sewa Sansthan has also worked for upliftment of women of this tribe along with their children. According to him when they talk of rights and entitlements, they had to fight for them. Not only their economic rights but their cultural rights had also been looted by everyone. Efforts should be made to bring the adivasis /tribes in the mainstream.

Dr. A. K. Tiwari, Faculty In-charge, Dr. Ram Manohar Lohiya took a Session on District Presentation. Participants were given an opportunity to present the Human Rights Violation in their District. Prostitution, Human Trafficking, Child Abuse, Poverty, Sexual Harassment, Police Atrocities were the common issues raised by the participants. Participants shared their experiences; and the efforts by them in protecting Human Rights. Enthusiastic Participants from different streams of Law, Sociology, and Criminology were trying to advocate a cause for Human Rights violations.

A Human Rights quiz was organized for the participants. Six teams participated in the quiz. The questions were framed by Dr. A.K. Tiwari and Mr. A.P. Singh, Faculty, Dr. Ram Manohar Lohiya National Law University. The Director of the University announced a cash prize for the winners. The proceedings of the quiz were recorded for broadcast in the **Yuvvani** programme of the All India Radio, Lucknow. The programme was broadcast on July 4, 2008.

After the above doctrinal approach, the participants were sent to various NGOs/ Voluntary Organizations in and around Lucknow to observe and experience the ground realities of the Human Rights at the grass root level. During their placement with NGO/Voluntary Organizations the participants witnessed the Human Rights enforcement, challenges and problems by visiting various villages and places where these organizations worked.

VATSALYA is a Civil Society Organisation, which works for the welfare of women and children. One thing which is very peculiar to this organization is that it does not teach people to beg but trains them to grab their rights. It makes people aware of their rights so that they can demand their rights. The placement with Vatsalya sensitized the participants about poverty which the participants have mostly read in books before this placement. This was the first experience for them to witness what poverty really means and that it is a curse for the poor. This really is an irony in the time when we boast ourselves to be at the verge of becoming a superpower.

SAHBHAGI SHIKSHA KENDRA (SSK) is a supportive organization, which helps in building the capacity of the NGOs working directly in the field. The aim of this organization is to train the NGOs in such a way that they successfully sensitise the masses and ameliorate the grievances. SSK's main emphasis is on the empowerment of the Panchayat Raj System in Uttar Pradesh. It also works in the field of local governance in Urban areas, the Right to Information Act, etc. The participants placed with SURAKSHA presented their views. In the initial

days they they visited the office of the Probation Officer which is situated in District Magistrate Office in front of Lucknow High Court. The participants went there to know the status of the cases and the method adopted by them to settle the cases under Domestic Violence Act. Nearly 400 cases under Domestic Violence Act come every month. The participants met several counselors. There was a Seminar on Women Empowerment, where the status and position of women was discussed and the probable solutions were deliberated upon. Suraksha as a Family Counselling Centre make every possible efforts to preserve the marriage of the people who approach them and they ensure the dignity of women.

The participants who worked with the Laxmi and Ehsaas Organization got exposure on the women and child issues. The SPARC organization is working on the disability issues. Dynamic Action Group and People's Positive Network are working for the rights of the Dalits and people effected from HIV/AIDS.

There was a talk on International Humanitarian Law by Mr.C.Banerjee, International Committee of Red Cross((ICRC). International Humanitarian Law applies in cases of conflict. If there is no conflict it does not apply. The basic concepts of International Humanitarian Law, its purpose and its applications were told. Human rights law applied to all kinds of situations except war. The fundamental aspects of International



Humanitarian Law and Human rights law was told to the participants. Many important issues of Prisoners of War and War Criminals were discussed. The harsh realities of genocide was told. A Documentary was also shown to the participants which showed the curse of war and the various functions performed by International Committee of Red Cross (ICRC).

The programme was also blessed by two prominent figures of the Nation for whom Human Rights of the disadvantaged groups is not a subject for discussion only but for practice itself. These two luminaries practiced and raised their voices for the protection of the human rights of the poor and disadvantaged groups throughout their life. The one was the Hon'ble Justice Mr. Rajendra Babu, Chairperson, National Human Rights Commission, New Delhi and another was the Prof. N.R.Madhva Menon who is known as the father of the Law Schools in India.

On 12th July, 2008 while interacting with the participants they raised some very relevant issues which needed immediate attention of the public and the persons who were working for the protection of human rights.

Both the experts emphasized on these points

1. NHRC was not only performing their duties of protection of human rights but also helping in making the human relations strong.
2. There was an urgent need to

expand the programmes of the Human Rights.

3. The ambit of human rights is very vast and there is a need to cater for the constitutional democratic values of the nation.
4. The malnutrition and starvation was also the core area of human rights. Issue of Dalit Rights should be more focused and needs urgent attention.
5. Police and Judiciary were not sensitive towards the human rights issues of poor.
6. Protection of Human Rights was a need of a larger population of India.
7. Establishment of Human Rights Clubs could be a better option for the awareness of human rights among students.
8. Rights and Duties go together.
9. One should not talk about their rights in isolation.
10. Delay in justice process is also a violation of human rights.

Adding to these aspects Prof. Balraj Chauhan, Director of the Institute said that youth of this country can bring some positive changes in the process of protection of human rights and to achieve this goal they have first to be sensitized, made aware and be committed towards such issues. Youths also have to ensure that they are not the party to any human rights violation.

In his lecture on "Emerging paradigms of the Legal Education" Prof Chauhan focused on the new issues



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which were problems for the society. He also told about the various problems faced by the vulnerable and weaker groups of the society. Law could act as a change agent in the process of social transformation, he added.

Prof. K.D.Rao, Director, IGNOU Law School, New Delhi delivered the lectures on Anti Torture Jurisprudence and Right to Legal Aid. In some way both the things are interrelated many times. He pointed out that the governments have to strengthen the legal aid system in order to ensure access to justice for the poor.

The intern presented their project reports and viva voce was conducted under the supervision of the external examiners: Prof. P.C.Joshi, Prof. S.K. Khandelwal and Dr. Arshad of Garhwal Campus, Kumaoun University.

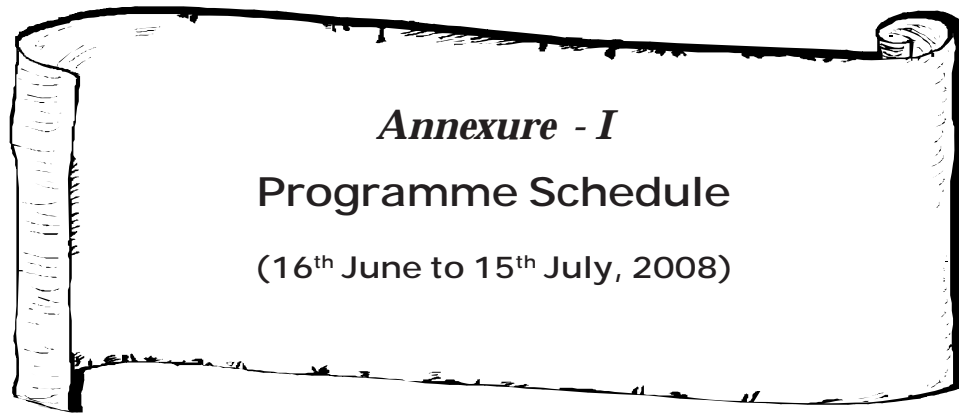
Last day, a Valedictory Session was organized and certificates were distributed to the students.



SUMMER TRAINING PROGRAMME AT RML NATIONAL LAW UNIVERSITY

'Human rights must be included in school syllabus'

CHAIRPERSON OF State Human Rights Commission, Justice HK Sena was of the view that elements on human rights must be included in school syllabus so that students could be made aware about it from an early age. He said, "the need of the hour is to spread awareness among the masses for respecting other's rights and to raise voices if their own human rights are infringed or violated by an individual or masses."

Justice Sena was addressing the participants of Summer Human Rights Training programme organized by Dr Sanjay Kumar Mishra National Law University on Thursday. He said that basic components of human rights should be taught in schools to sensitize students about the significance

of human rights. Unlike fundamental rights, education of human rights would be of big help in spreading awareness, said Justice Sena.

He further said, "It is time that students of generation next must know about the utility of human rights. Besides, educating them, press can also play an important role in spreading awareness. Press should play the role of voice of voiceless. Media should reduce the grossness of dowry deaths and the poor." Justice Sena said that grossness of the marginalized sections of the society should be addressed.

Talking about the role of press, he said that press should function as the mouthpiece of the common man. "They can do help in forming public opinion," he said. He also said that so far press had played an important role and the State Human Rights Commission

had taken suo moto cognizance of media reports on how a nurse and doctor in a primary health centre in Gurgaon asked for Rs 1000 from the family of a patient.

When asked to point out some districts in UP where complaints of Human Rights violations were, Justice said that few districts in West UP that are close to New Delhi and some districts in West UP especially in Lucknow and Allahabad complaints were higher. But he attributed this to awareness of the masses for human rights.

"Below violation human rights more than any other body or institution," he said. Police function also amounts to human rights violation. He said that State Human Rights Commission is doing the job in right manner. But it is provided with more powers, it can actually play a very effective role.

Bid to sensitise students on human rights

Lucknow: There is a lot of difference between "knowing" and "understanding". Human rights was so far a part of classroom teaching but now students of law as well as liberal arts and social sciences have got an opportunity to understand the issue through lectures and field work.

As many as 62 students from across the state arrived at RML National Law University

(RMLNLU) on Tuesday for a month long "Summer Human Rights Training Programme" sponsored by the National Human Rights Commission (NHRC).

The NHRC has been organising an internship programme for the students across the country on human rights issues. But it was a limited to only 60 odd students every year. Now in a bid to expand its efforts to sensitise students on human rights, NHRC has now decided to out source its training programme. RMLNLU is the first university in the country to have been chosen for this training programme. If the pilot project turns out to be a success, it will be replicated in other places too.

In the month long training programme, students, hailing from various state universities and degree colleges, will attend

classroom lectures covering theoretical, social, economical, and international aspects of human rights. Experts from over the country have been invited to deliberate the issue with participants. Thereafter, students will be sent for field work where they will get an opportunity to see the ground realities. Students also work with the non-government organisations (NGOs) operating in an area. They will prepare project reports based on the



experience. Students will also have an opportunity to interact with NHRC chair Justice Rajendra Prasad and various other legal luminaries.

Apart from

basic human rights of every individual, students will also be sensitised to the rights of women, child, newborn and HIV positive persons. There will be special sessions on media and human rights, domestic violence, right to information, role of judiciary in protecting human rights, human traffic, rights of prisoners and rights of backward classes and scheduled caste/tribe.

On Tuesday, the programme was inaugurated by Justice Mishra, chairman state law commission. State advocate general Jyotindra Mishra, traced the history and evolution of modern concept of human rights. "

The struggle to preserve, protect and promote basic human rights continues in every generation and in every society," he said.



S&T law centre to come up at RML varsity

Lucknow: The Science and Technology Law Centre, first of its type in the country, will be established at the RML National Law University (RMLNLU) here. The centre will offer specialisation and conduct research in various legal aspects related to science and technology.

The highlight of the centre would be "air and space law" to be developed in association with McGill University, Canada. Top notch space scientists of the country like K Kasturirangan and Madhavan Nair will be involved in designing of curriculum and research material required to regulate

The centre will also cover areas like cyber law, intellectual property rights, maritime law, medical science among others. Prof Mithun Menon, founder director of National Law University, Bangalore, and father of 7-year integrated law course in India, has agreed to be the mentor of the centre.

At present, member, Commission on Centre State Relationship, Prof Menon was at RMLNLU on Saturday to deliver a talk at the valedictory session of the human rights training programme. He recalled how K Kasturirangan, former chairman, Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) had asked him 20 years back to start thinking about laws regulating "air and space" and legal remedies which would be required to settle disputes related to control of space and satellites. "Now the time has come to work in this direction," he said.

Prof Balraj Chauhan, vice-chancellor, RMLNLU, told TOI that at present

prime tasks of the centre would be to conduct research and recommend government to come out with specific laws in this regard. There are other aspects of science and technology as well which have not been touched by law so far, he said. Even the Information Technology Act passed by the Parliament few years back was proving insufficient in regulating cyber crimes, he added. Besides conducting studies and research, the centre will also develop courses to train students in legal matters related to science and technology. A separate building for the project is already under construction. "We are also in touch with some scientists

Society, state, judiciary: 3 challenges to human rights

SOCIETY ITSELF was the biggest violator of human rights and the recent G ujar agitation was a living example. People of the G ujar community paralysed the railway traffic in that region and stalled all other activities which caused a lot of inconvenience to the people at large, said member, Commission on Centre-State Relations, New Delhi Prof. NR Madhava Menon on Saturday.

Speaking at the valedictory function of the month-long summer training human rights camp organised by Dr Ram Manohar Lohiya National Law University, he said that there were three challenges to human rights.

"Society tops the chart. Judiciary and state follow," said Prof. Menon and added that G ujar violence exposed the fact that rule of law was in jeopardy.

"The G ujar agitation has established that if you are violent, authority will take note of it. This kind of incident of violence is on a rise in the country," Prof. Menon said. This agitation also highlighted the fact that the constitutional values was in danger, he said.

He also said that the judiciary was another agency that violated human rights to a large extent. Poor conviction rate coupled with the number of cases pending before the court amounted to violation of human rights. Individuals get justice after a long wait that run into several years.

Last but not least, the state too violated human rights. Right to food and right to education, which the citizens was entitled to, were not being adhered to by the state. Incidents of children dying due to malnutrition called for concern and needed to be addressed seriously he said.

Prof. Menon said that the time had come to establish a human rights club in the school to create awareness among students. He said that rather than incorporate human rights in the curriculum, it would be better if it could be taught through extra-curricular activities.

He was of the view that while most people talked of human rights and other fundamental rights guaranteed by the Constitution, very few people talked in terms of their duties that come along with the rights.

"One should not talk about their rights in isolation. Youth of this country need to be told about this," said Prof. Menon.
